What is the Latino Internship in Health Disparities Research?

The Latino Internship in Health Disparities Research program at *Juntos* Center for Advancing Latino Health, at the University of Kansas Medical Center (KUMC). This internship program engages high school, undergraduate, and graduate students in research projects, mentorship, and structured training classes focused on key dimensions of health disparities, in a culturally diverse setting.

What are the eligibility criteria?

Eligible participants are high school, undergraduate, and graduate students from under-represented communities or interested in working with under-represented communities in the metropolitan Kansas City area and rural areas of the state of Kansas.

Is this a program only for students interested in applying to, or already enrolled at the University of Kansas or the University of Kansas Medical Center?

No. We welcome all eligible students who are interested in learning about health disparities and research in the medical field.

How many interns are accepted per semester?

This internship is highly competitive. We accept approximately 4 to 10 interns per semester. **If you are a student applying for a summer internship and we are unable to offer you a space, you may be invited to participate in our fall and/or spring internship programs.**

Is there a fee for participating in this program?

No, there is no participation fee.

What are the expectations for interns?

During the summer semester, interns are expected to work 5 days a week (Monday through Friday), from approximately 9am to 3pm. Please note that each intern's schedule may vary, depending on assigned tasks and activities. For spring and fall semesters, interns will agree on a fitting schedule with their respective mentors during orientation week and are expected to follow their schedule throughout the entire duration of the internship.

Unless otherwise required, interns will be working on KUMC premises.

Do interns receive a stipend?

Upon successful completion of the program, participants *might* be eligible to receive a modest stipend.

Is there any transportation and/or housing assistance for interns from rural areas of the state of Kansas?

Although the Latino Internship in Health Disparities Research program highly encourages students from all parts of the Kansas City metropolitan area and rural Kansas to apply, it is important that applicants take into consideration that the internship program *will not* provide any transportation and/or housing arrangements for any students accepted into the program. All costs related to travel, insurance, accommodation, and living expenses must be taken care of by either the interns or their sponsoring institutions.

What is the curriculum of the internship program?

The Latino Internship in Health Disparities Research curriculum covers a broad variety of health-related topics. A distinct curriculum is carefully developed for each semester by the coordinators of the internship program along with KUMC faculty and community partners. Interns will receive a detailed curriculum of the internship program at orientation week.

Topics to be covered include, but are not limited to:

- Defining Health Disparities
- Health Disparities in Immigrant Communities
- Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR)
- Tobacco Consumption among minority populations

- Gender, Race, Class and Health
- Health Coalitions in Kansas City
- Breast Health among minority women in Kansas
- Processes and Guidelines to Applying and Getting Accepted into Medical School
- Mental Health Disparities
- Cultural and Linguistic Competency in the Medical Field
- Motivational Lectures with Special Guest Speakers
- Preparing for the Professional Field

Additionally, interns work daily with their faculty mentors and research staff to conduct individual research projects.

Interns will have the opportunity to shape the curriculum by expressing their interests in specific health-related topics. Although not always feasible, we seek to incorporate interns' suggestions in the curriculum.

When can I apply?

There are 3 deadlines depending on the internship semester you are applying for:

2016 Semester: July 20th at 5:00 PM (CST)

Spring 2017 Semester: November 23rd at 5:00 PM (CST)
